If you follow our Facebook feed (you are missing out if you do not!), you will be aware of just how much has taken place at St Mary's this term; the fun, the excitement, the sheer breadth of opportunities and experiences that our students have engaged with is phenomenal. As well as everything you might expect to happen during a normal school day, we have had extra-curricular clubs such as Wild Art Club every Friday, Rock Club, football, netball, rugby, archery, table tennis, dance club, kick boxing to name but a few. Mrs Monro set up our exciting new our Reading Ambassadors programme which has involved the students in promoting a love of reading across the school. We danced the night away in October at the first School Association disco of the year. Then came Year 5's rainforest day when the school was transformed into a microcosm of the Amazon jungle. We have enjoyed multiple visiting authors and been inspired by professional musicians. Now Christmas is near and the the final week of term continues at pace with the terrifically successful School Association Christmas Market, carol competitions and the Royal Navy bringing Santa to St Mary's in a very impressive Merlin helicopter!

Alongside the festive frenzy are our Christmas church carol services which as well as allowing us to enjoy the talents of our wonderful choir and instrumentalists, offered us a valuable opportunity to reflect on some of the deeper meanings of the season. Two of our core values at St Mary's are kindness and equality. Christmas is indeed the season of kindness and good will but it is also a time that can expose inequality; something that our students are fully committed to tackling.

In September, our pupils and their families donated a van-load of food and other products for Dorchester Food Bank as part of our harvest festival celebrations. Date for your diary...A letter went home this week regarding the SATS Parents Information evening which will take place on Thursday 18th January 2024, 6.00pm.



Recently there have been several incidents related to the misuse of WhatsApp. As a school we want to inform

you that these incidents are involving several children in Year 5 being part of chat groups, and, in the latest incident, being exposed to particularly unpleasant language.

WhatsApp is a chat application which can be used on a mobile phone or tablet and it lets you send messages, images and videos to friends. You can have one-to-one and group conversations.

This letter is to make you aware that your child may be using WhatsApp without your knowledge and you should be mindful that the minimum age for WhatsApp is 16 or over.

We are continuing to investigate this latest incident. In the meantime, we ask that you carefully monitor what your child is viewing online, and that they are reminded that they must tell you if they receive anything inappropriate from any application.

How to Make a Christmas Everyday Potion by Charlie G 5FE

PRIVATE FOSTERING

What is private fostering?

Private fostering is an arrangement whereby a child under the age of 16 (or 18 if the child has a disability) is placed for 28 days or more in the care of someone who is not the child's parent, grandparent, aunt, uncle, sister, brother or step-parent. In a private fostering arrangement, the parent retains Parental Responsibility.

It is essential that the local authority are notified if a child is living with someone who is not their parent or a 'connected person' for longer than 28 days.

The local authority need to be satisfied that the placement is suitable and the child is safe. To be defined as 'private fostering', the child must be living with that person for longer than 28 days and this should be continuous, but can include occasional short breaks.
